Subject Specific Vocabulary

empathy	Empathy is being able to know how someone else is feeling, even when you aren't in the same situation.
Protected characteristics	Having a protected characteristic means you have a right not to be treated less favourably, or subjected to an unfair disadvantage, by reason of that characteristic.
inequality	Not treated equally.
stereotype	An often unfair and untrue belief that many people have about all people or things with a particular characteristic.
discrimination	Discrimination is when someone treats you differently, unfairly or worse because of a protected characteristic.
inclusive	To include or make a part of something.
ethnicity	Ethnicity is defined by culture , national customs , language or beliefs.
culture	All the ways of life including arts, beliefs and institutions of a population that are passed down from generation to generation.
faith	Putting complete trust or confidence in something or someone.
